A BILL

To amend title V of the Social Security Act to support stillbirth prevention and research, and for other purposes.

1 *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-*
2 *tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,*

3 **SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.**

4 This Act may be cited as the “Maternal and Child
5 Health Stillbirth Prevention Act of 2022”.

6 **SEC. 2. FINDINGS.**

7 Congress finds the following:

8 (1) According to the Centers for Disease Con-
9 trol and Prevention—

1 (A) in the United States, 1 in 169 births
2 are affected by stillbirth each year amounting
3 to 23,500 stillbirths annually, of which 6,900 of
4 these are Black or African-American stillbirths;

5 (B) the number of stillbirths each year is
6 greater than the number of babies that die dur-
7 ing the first year of life;

8 (C) annual stillbirths are more than ten
9 times the number of annual deaths due to Sud-
10 den Infant Death Syndrome (SIDS);

11 (D) stillbirth occurs across all demo-
12 graphics and in otherwise healthy pregnancies.
13 It is most common, however, among women
14 who—

15 (i) are Black or African American, at
16 two times more likely than White women
17 to have a stillbirth;

18 (ii) are of lower socioeconomic status;

19 (iii) are diagnosed with high blood
20 pressure, diabetes, obesity, or other med-
21 ical conditions;

22 (iv) are 35 years of age or older;

23 (v) smoke cigarettes while pregnant;

24 (vi) have previously experienced preg-
25 nancy loss; or

1 (vii) have multiple pregnancies, for ex-
2 ample triplets; and

3 (E) while the rate of stillbirth has declined
4 since the 1940s due to improvements in mater-
5 nity care, in recent years, the decline has
6 slowed or halted.

7 (2) According to a study by researcher Wall-
8 Wieler et al., published in *Obstetrics and Gyne-*
9 *cology*, “the risk of severe maternal morbidity
10 among stillbirth deliveries was more than fourfold
11 higher compared with live birth deliveries”.

12 (3) According to a study by researcher McClure
13 et al., published in the *International Journal of Gyn-*
14 *ecology and Obstetrics*, “stillbirth was significantly
15 associated with maternal mortality”.

16 (4) According to a review article by Murphy
17 and Cacciatore, published in *Seminars in Fetal &*
18 *Neonatal Medicine*, stillbirth has psychological im-
19 pacts on parents like grief, shame, and guilt and im-
20 pacts to family functioning and well-being.

21 (5) Stillbirth, and the disparity in those im-
22 pacted by stillbirth requires further research, sup-
23 port, and prevention programming.

1 **SEC. 3. CLARIFICATION SUPPORTING PERMISSIBLE USE OF**
2 **FUNDS FOR STILLBIRTH PREVENTION AC-**
3 **TIVITIES.**

4 Section 501(a) of the Social Security Act (42 U.S.C.
5 701(a)) is amended—

6 (1) in paragraph (1)(B), by inserting “to re-
7 duce the incidence of stillbirth,” after “among chil-
8 dren,”; and

9 (2) in paragraph (2), by inserting after “follow-
10 up services” the following: “, and for evidence-based
11 programs and activities and outcome research to re-
12 duce the incidence of stillbirth (including tracking
13 and awareness of fetal movements, improvement of
14 birth timing for pregnant people with risk factors,
15 initiatives that encourage safe sleeping positions for
16 pregnant people, screening and surveillance for fetal
17 growth restriction, efforts to achieve smoking ces-
18 sation amongst pregnant people, community-based
19 programs that provide home visits or other types of
20 support, and any other research or evidence-based
21 programming to prevent stillbirths)”.
